
Your illustration of "euphenics" is fine. Only a couple of comments.

Euphenics did not originate with my paper. "Euphenics" did.

If I had been more CI-oriented I would have taken care to quote more leading sources, like Plato and Aldous Huxley. But even so, some other citer doubtless will. If you look at Daedalus (Spring, 1965) p. 505, you will see a beautiful example of a linkage to the Utopian literature. Even if Maynard Smith had not coupled them, the coupling via H. J. Muller and J. Huxley surely would have led to this.

Further points - 1) how important it is to develop the whole global network, 2) but even so, extrinsic sources are still discovered when they are cited even if you don't have them in your source file.

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
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
